Women To Discuss World Unity At Campus Lecture

• University students will hear members of their own student body in an all-University lecture tomorrow when three coeds on the Women's Public Discussion Squad will speak on "Trade and International Unity" at 11 a.m. in Guggenheim auditorium.

Virginia Smith will analyze and present the problem, stressing how important solving the economic problems of the future is, and its importance as a factor in deciding peace. "International trade is most important as it affects all nations," she said.

Presenting two different solutions to the problem will be Phyllis Cowell and Corrine Lathrop. Their viewpoints will be, can this be handled through a regulated cartel system, or, free trade within limitations. Other angles also will be presented.

Trade Is Problem

Their discussions will be keyed to the question "How can we best adapt international trade policies to gain maximum of prosperity and a minimum of friction from economic causes?"

A question period will follow the talks.

Pat Niesz is student manager of the team with Wade Knisely of the speech faculty as coach. So far this year the group has spoken in Vancouver, B. C., Walla Walla, Portland, and before several Seattle organizations and meetings. There are about fifteen coeds in the squad.

The all-University lecture committee is sponsoring the assembly which is open to all students and faculty members and other persons interested. The committee has announced Sir Bernard Pares will speak next week at the regular weekly all-University lecture.
